About Our Queen Elizabeth School Community

Queen Elizabeth P.S. students and staff are proud of their 80 years of heritage and tradition. Our school has all students accommodated within the building and we enjoy the huge 4000 square foot gymnasium, the fully equipped art, music and science rooms, the state of the art stage and sound system and the multi-media library. As a community we take great pride in our school environment. The Eagle Caught Being Good recognition program continues to grow for our students.

Presently, our large urban elementary school on Simcoe Street North in Oshawa, houses 480 Junior-Kindergarten to Grade 8 students, four special education classes, 29.4 Teaching staff, an English as a Second Language teacher, a Literacy Coach, 13 Educational Assistants plus our secretarial and custodial staff. We share professional learning as a host school for teachers training with the Queen's , York and UOIT Faculty of Education programs and for Early Childhood Education and Educational Assistants training through Durham College.

Traditionally, we have serviced a highly transient student population in that the majority of our students have attended multiple schools. Our dedicated teaching staff collaborates diligently with our Special Education Resource Teachers plus support personnel involved in psychological services, attendance and speech and language to meet the diversified needs of the many Identified and At Risk students throughout each grade and division. We are very pleased to have had a full time Literacy Coach on site, and are very fortunate to engage in collaborative professional development to help us improve our instructional practices.

A small dedicated core of volunteers supplement staff efforts by offering intensive support to small reading groups or individuals, assisting on class trips and numerous preparation needs in the class. The school environment benefits from volunteer involvement in fund-raising activities, the School Community Council and Safe Arrival. We host many outreach programs at the school both during and after school hours. These programs help the school function as an integral part of the community.

To promote life-long social and employability skills, positive peer relationships, improved academic excellence and respectful behaviour, students are Caught being Good and recognized at monthly Character assemblies with certificates and notes of recognition from staff. Our varied extra curricular programs are available to develop academic, athletic and artistic talents and to enhance the social skills and citizenship skills for our Eagles. Our Student Council is part of a focus on developing student leadership skills. Student Council members continue to plan exciting programs and events along with the teachers and parents. We have been involved in the STAR camp program which provided training and leadership opportunities for our intermediate students.

About the 2008-2009 Results/Next Steps

EQAO data on grade 3 and grade 6 student achievement serves as information for improving curriculum delivery and assessment techniques through the staff development of an EQAO action plan. Our school improvement teams have been analyzing the EQAO data as we did last year to determine our next steps to support continued improvement in literacy achievement. This data , will be guiding our school improvement plans with a view to becoming even better at ensuring student learning and achievement.

Grade 3 and Grade 6 Results

Our results for the 2008-2009 school year indicate that students at Queen Elizabeth Public School experienced some difficulty with some areas of the assessment, while achieving very good results on others.

28 % of our students in grade 3 tested at levels 3 &4 in reading compared to 40% in the previous year. Over time our grade 3 students have improved, with a score of 11% in 2003-04 to a score of 34% in 2005 - 2006.

In Writing 38% of our grade 3 achieved at or above the provincial standard. This is a good score when compared to most of our previous results, as we had a score of 25% in 2006-07, and 30% in 2005-06, but does represent a drop from our 51% last year.

28% of our students in grade 3 tested at levels 3 & 4 in mathematics compared to 38% in the previous year, and this result is also cause for some concern.

Our grade 6 students experienced some impressive improvement in their literacy scores this year.

63% of our students in grade 6 tested at levels 3 &4 in reading compared to 46% in the previous year and 24% in 2003-04. This represents an increase of 17%.

We also experienced an increase in our grade 6 writing results., with an impressive 61% of our students in grade 6 testing at levels 3 & 4 in writing compared to 38% in the previous year. This is an increase of 23%.

Finally, in Math, 33% of our grade 6 students achieved at level 3&4. This is up from 27% in the previous year, but still represents a decline from our best results. This is an area of some concern, and we are investigating the causes and possible solutions to this decline. We are developing strategies and resources too support all our students

We continue to be proud of your children and our teachers for their hard work as we continue to strive for academic excellence in our school. If you look at the data over the past five years, this year's scores do represent an improvement over time in most areas of the assessment. Our goal continues to be continuous improvement from year to year.

It is important to acknowledge the tremendous support of the Durham District School Board who are providing us with outstanding resources as we continue on the journey toward academic excellence. Our teachers, educational assistants and support staff should be congratulated for taking full advantage of the learning opportunities and challenges that we have presented to them. I am very pleased with the collective effort of our staff. The entire school report is available on the Durham District School Board's website and both Mrs. Elmhurst and I are available to discuss this with you if you have any questions about the data and our school focus on student learning.

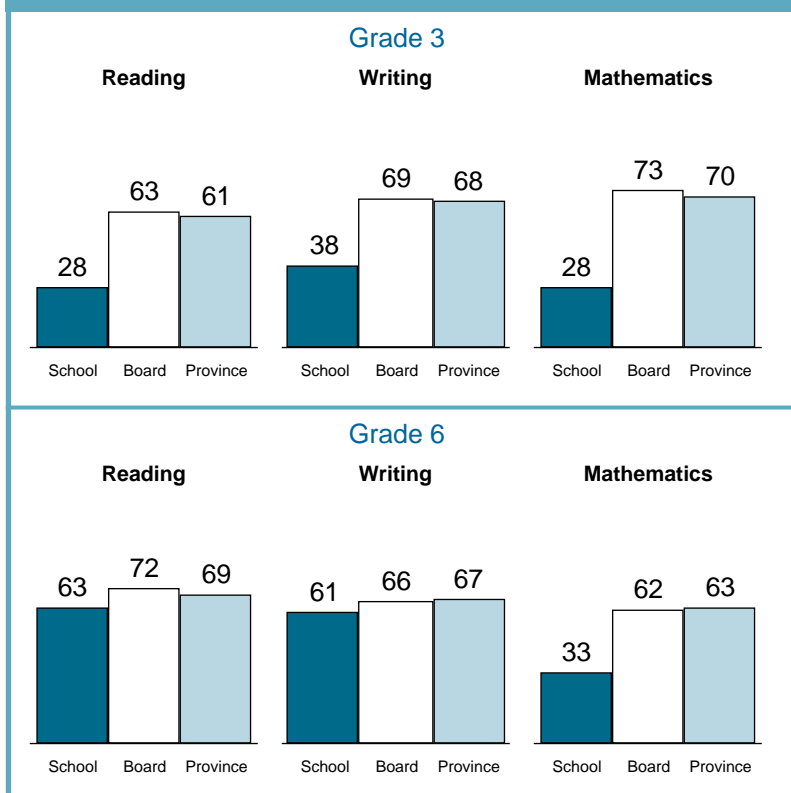
I trust this report will help parents, educators and all who support a strong public education system work together so that all students can reach their full potential.

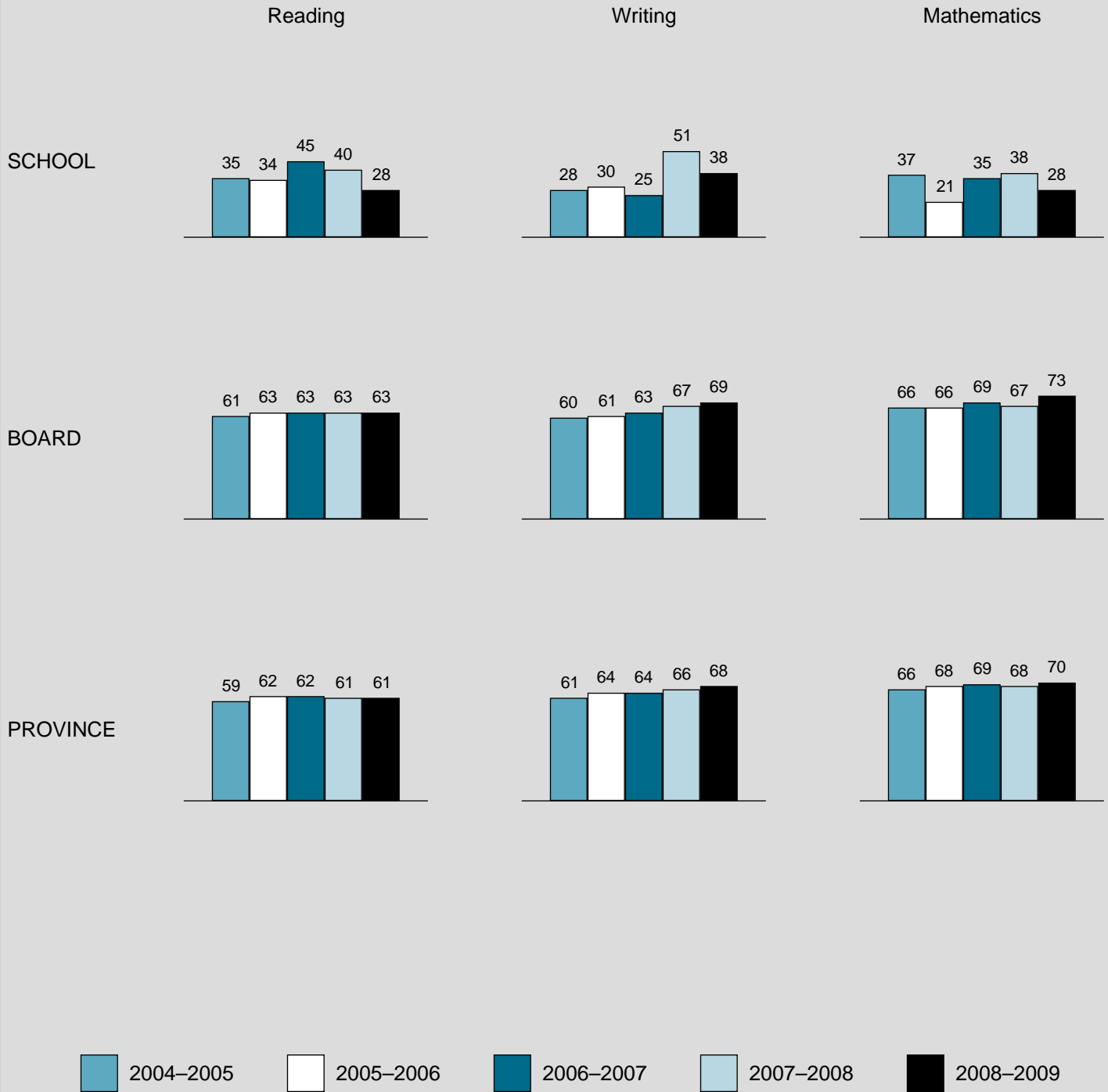

Percentage of Students: Grade 3

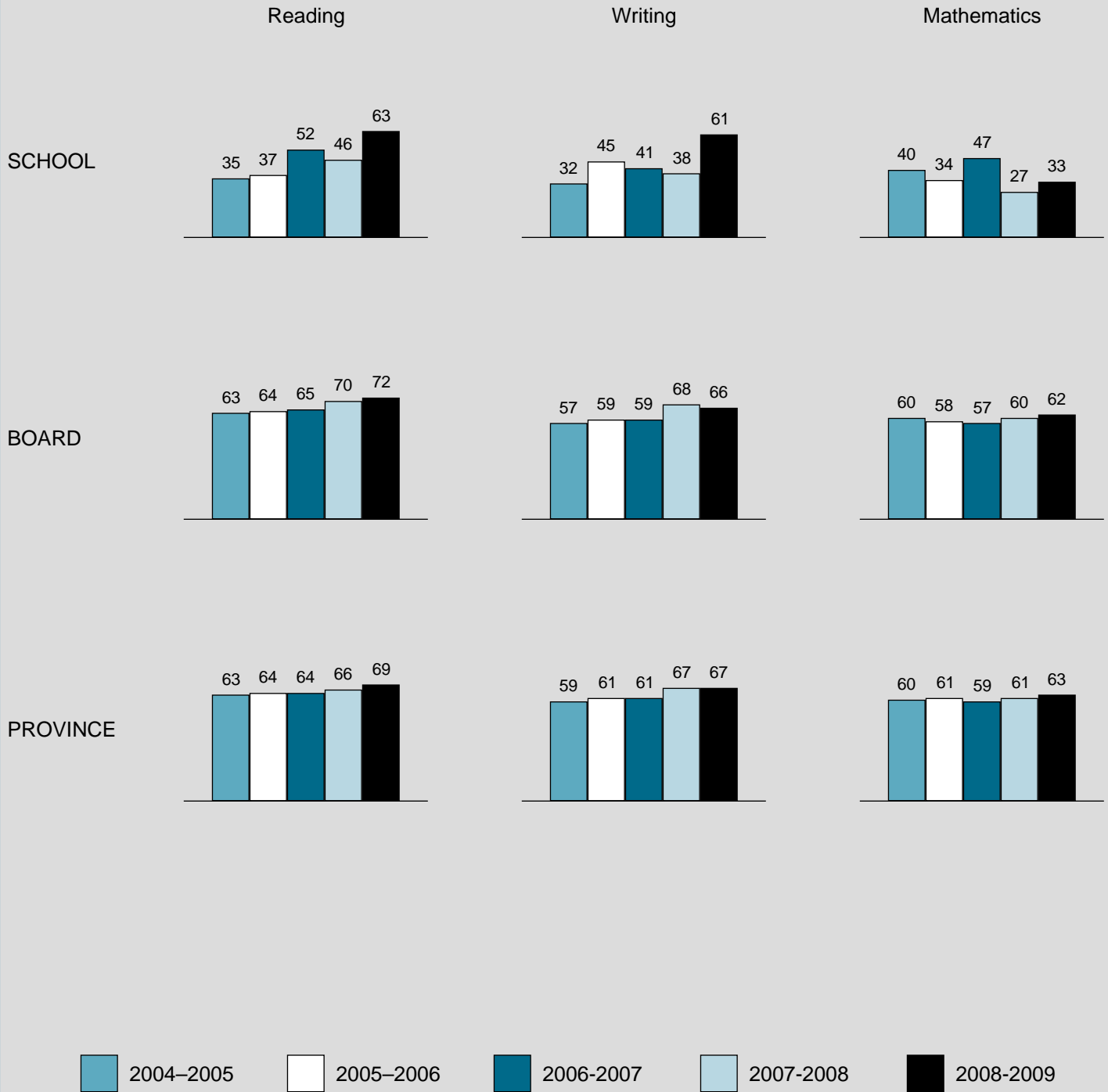

TIPS

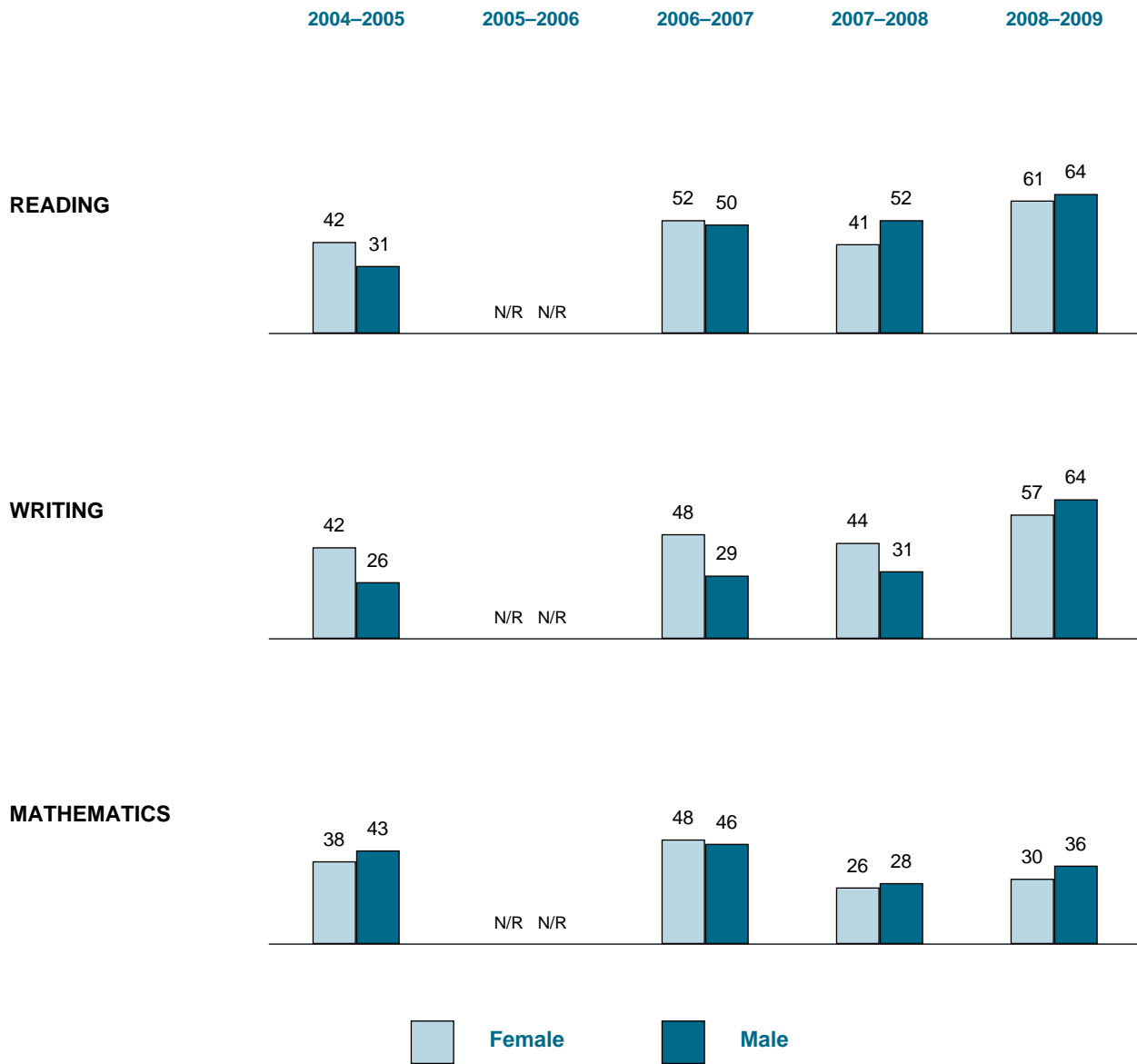
