About Our School/Community

R.A. Sennett Public School (formerly known as King Street P.S.) is located in a residential area near the central business district of downtown Whitby. Schools have been located on the site since the mid 1800's. The present building was opened in 1921 and later renamed after the school's long-serving first principal. Several additions have been made, including a new gymnasium in the mid 1980's. Our community is experiencing a decline in population and as a result R. A. Sennett now serves approximately 250 students. More than half the students are bussed. Our community is both economically and culturally diverse. We have a half time English as a Second Language teacher who works with our students, as we have one of the highest percentages of ESL students in the Durham District School Board. Many of our students have been in Canada for less than three years. We have students from a variety of countries - Afghanistan, Pakistan, India, Egypt, Greece, Panama, Venezuela, and Iran - to name only a few. Many of our students have come from war-torn regions and consequently have gaps in their educational backgrounds. Additionally, we have had the support of a Literacy Coach for the past 7 years and will continue to do so this academic year.

Our school continues to offer a daily nutritional snack program which offers breakfast and snacks to all students each day. These programs are supported by local service clubs and community groups as well as private donations and provincial funding. The program is made possible by our parent volunteers. We at R.A. Sennett P.S. place emphasis on developing students skills in literacy and numeracy. With the partnership of our literacy coach and board facilitators, our teachers have concentrated literacy block times in all divisions. These literacy blocks include independent reading and writing, guided reading and writing and concentrated word studies in our primary division. Our Reading for the Love of It programs partners with the community and helps to develop reading strategies for both students and their parents. In the area of Mathematics skills, we have been focussing on the language of Mathematics and an increased use of Math manipulatives. We continue to grow through our PLC's (Professional Learning Communities) with our staff members in the areas of Literacy, Numeracy, Technology, and Safe Schools to focus on the skills and foundations needed to support and promote excellence in our academic and social programs.

Respect and peaceful conflict resolution is another of our major goals, and to this end, we focus heavily on Character Education. There are four pillars on which we concentrate: Academics, Respect, Leadership, and Teamwork. In 2003-2004, we introduced the Social Skills/Character Education program for problem-solving and conflict resolution strategies. We continue to run this program at the classroom and school level following the progressive discipline model. We continue to run our Character Education program with our staff and students. This program focuses on traits such as Respect, Empathy, and Courage throughout each month with special events and assemblies planned to educate and increase the awareness for our students around these traits.

Finally, our staff continues to engage in professional development sessions to enhance their knowledge in all curricular areas. Our PLC team meets monthly for half a day to work collaboratively with each other in the planning and implementing comprehensive literacy blocks,

assessment, diagnostic testing and numeracy

About the 2008 -2009 Results / Next Steps

The staff of R.A.Sennett have reviewed the results of the 2008-2009 primary and junior Provincial assessments. Both staff and School Community Council will meet to discuss the statistics; analyse changes in participation rates, turn over rates, and sample size in last year's grade 3 and 6 population.

The focus will be on determining the implications for school programming, assessment techniques and instructional practices at R.A.Sennett for the coming year. We shall target curriculum areas for review and set goals for our students and the School Improvement Plan. These indicators will be shared with our School Community Council to solicit their input and with an aim to involving our parents as partners in the learning process.

Final scores as shown represent the percentage of students at or above the provincial level. (Level 3 & 4) In summary, 64% of grade 3 students in reading and 82% of students in writing achieved at or above the provincial standard. In mathematics 68% of our grade 3 students reached the provincial standard.

In reading 54% and in writing 42% of Grade 6 students achieved results at or above the Provincial standard. Results in grade 6 mathematics indicate 38% achieved the provincial standard.

Our results represented an anomaly in what had previously been a positive trend upward in our student achievement. We shall be exploring new ways to motivate our students, involve our parents, and strive to meet the Provincial goal of 75% of all students at the level 3 & 4 in reading, writing and mathematics.

Key Strategies for Improvement will include:

- continue a comprehensive reading and writing program
- extend the Home Reading program
- use of exemplars to promote level 3 & 4 written responses
- continues use of CASI and Running Records to plan appropriately for each child
- use of Write Traits program and a focus on non-fiction
- more time devoted to daily reading and writing
- further development of our Literacy Blocks
- targeted intervention for struggling readers
- use of manipulative math tools to introduce and solidify concepts
- use of technology

R.A.Sennett was designated as a "School on the Move" in the spring of 2008 and we are proud of our recognition and award by the Ministry as a vital, creative learning community. We shall continue to bring our focused efforts so that all students will be successful and confident.

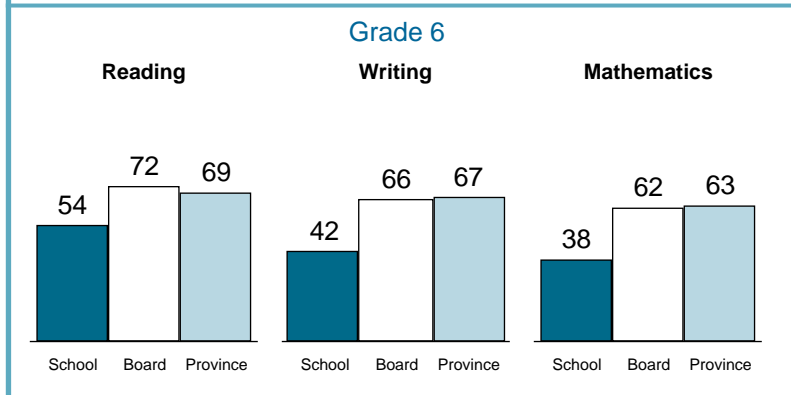
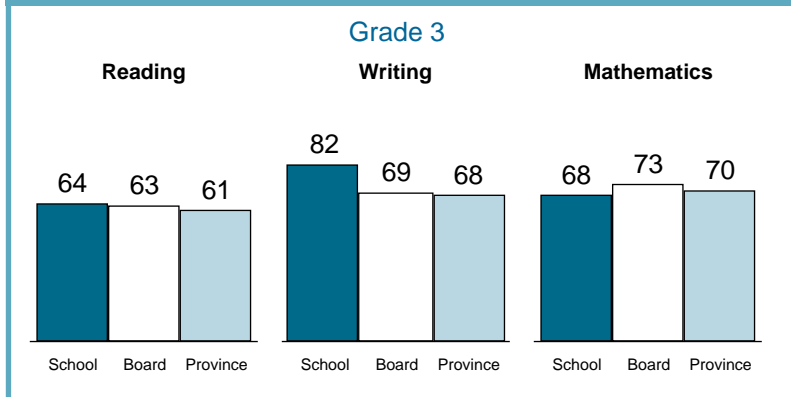

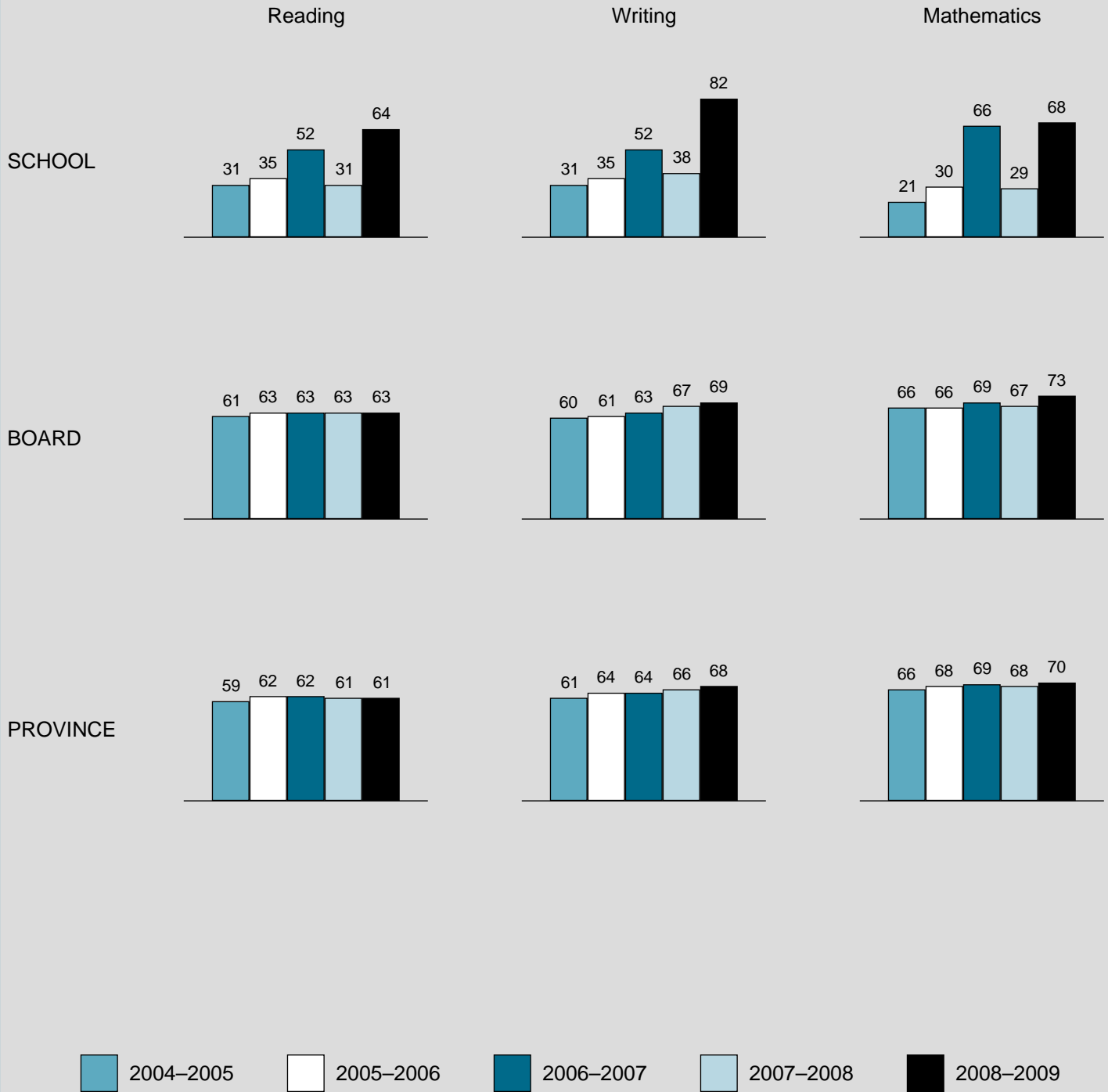

Percentage of Students: Grade 3

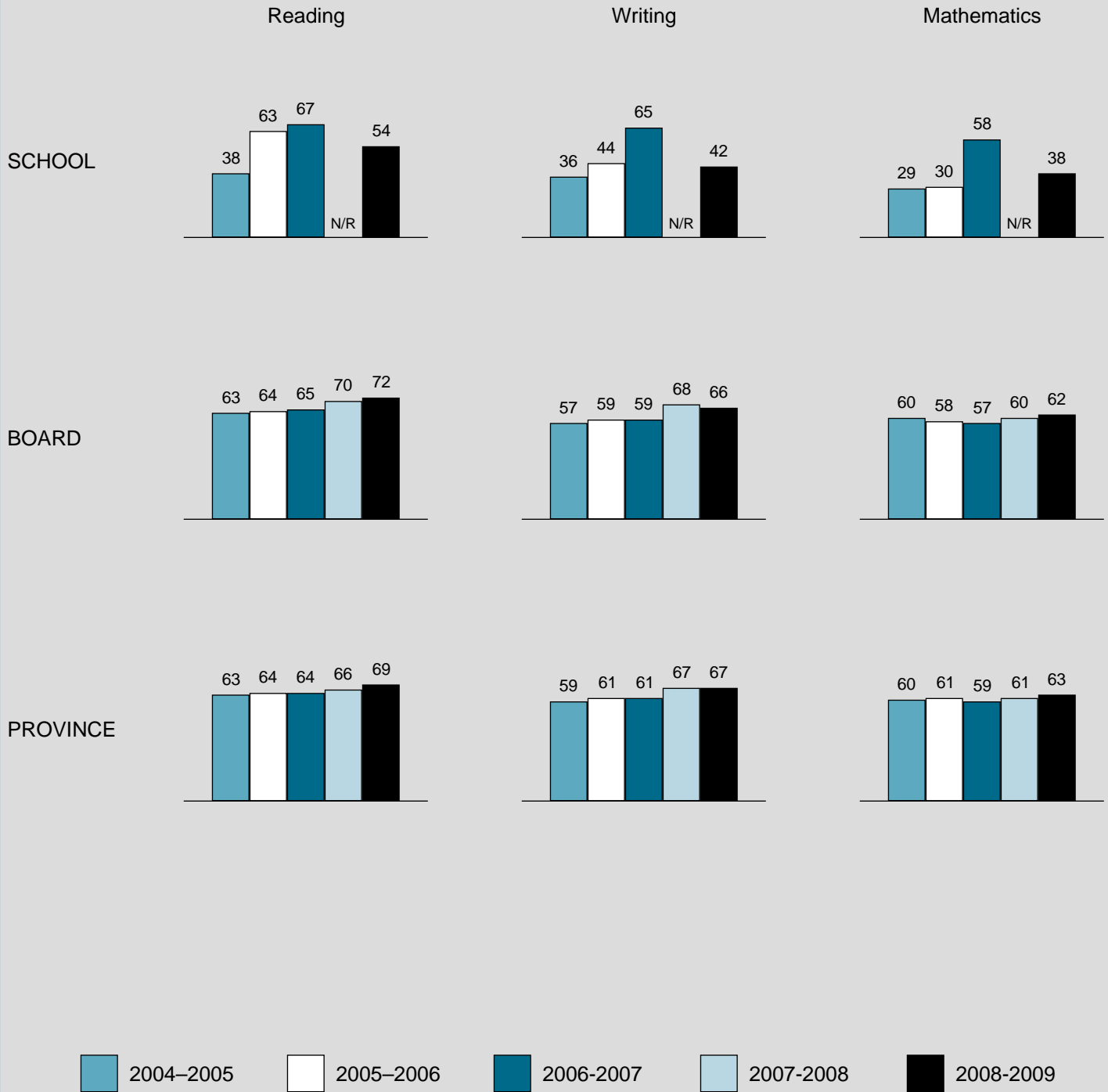

TIPS
